Dennis is celebrating 90

ebrate 90! Dennis was born in Coalville to a family of 8 children, his mum had full hands being a housewife and his dad worked 7 days a week as a surface mechanical engineer for the British Coal to keep his family comfortable. Dennis went to school in Coalville and, at 16, joined his dad at British Coal in the Planning department

and remained there for 39 vears until his retirement in 1990. He managed to work his way up to become the Head of Project Planning taking care of new plants in a large area of the Midlands.

Dennis enjoyed dancing and it was at the Ball Room in Coalville where he met Doreen whom he married in 1959. Doreen lived in Nailstone since she was 5 months old and therefore naturally their

wedding took place at the Nailstone Church. They immediately moved to the end cottage of 67 Main Street (by the Oak Tree, now a single house) and Dennis with the help of Doreen and her dad started to build their forever home The Coppice (47 Church Street). In 1972 their daughter Kathryn was born and when she got married she also chose the Nailstone Church as a venue.

Dennis and Doreen travelled around the world visiting New Zealand, Canada, Thailand etc but Dennis's true passion has always been gardening. He fell in love with Chrysanthemum and after retirement, he joined the National Chrysanthemum Society and started exhibiting around the UK. His speciality was the Anemone species with which he became twice the National and also Northern Champion. There is no surprise as he kept a detailed planning diary to make sure every plant was precisely prepared for each show demonstrating its

outstanding beauty. Dennis retired from exhibiting in 2004 but every year his front garden transforms into a showground for us all to enjoy.

Nailstone Gardening Group were excited to secure a 'Making a Difference' grant that funded the planting of nearly 5000 bulbs throughout Nailstone. We worked in partnership with Nailstone Parish Council to discuss and identify key areas in the village that could be planted. Through meetings, we were able to identify four key areas that when planted would provide a visual spectacle when viewed on foot and by car. This would engage both residents of the village and those passing through the village.

Bulb Planting Project

Once the Parish Council had obtained the relevant landowner permissions it was time to order the bulbs. The bulbs were chosen to provide a succession of flowering from February to mid-May and were chosen for their garden-worthiness. Two suppliers were used, one a local business and one a specialist supplier. The bulbs took 3 weeks to all arrive. Long-handled bulb planters were ordered to minimise the need to bend. Once arrived the bulbs were divided into four lots, one for each location. We chose a slightly different mix of bulbs for each location due to the conditions of the

Planting sessions were held on a weekend morning over six sessions, starting in November and finishing at the start of the New Year. Volunteers were provided with a hi-vis to wear and tasks rotated to avoid straining muscles. We planted in some rain, wind, cold, mud and a bit of sunshine!
