Garden Group

It's usual for us to hear 'rain stopped play' but we are not used to hearing 'sun and heat stopped play'! The group had been looking forward to getting stuck into this year's larger project, the enlargement of the planting area and addition of new planting to the Memorial Area on Church Meadow. This project will involve the lifting of turf as the beds are enlarged, but it has simply been too dry and hot to attempt this so far. The ground is like concrete. Additionally, spending money and trying to establish new planting in this weather will be an uphill struggle. To give ourselves the best chance of success the group sees this as an early Autumn project. The work will be done in stages, so that the area will look presentable for Remembrance Sunday. We have been really pleased to see that the home-grown gap fillers planted in the Centenary, Rock and Church bed are in flower, Gardening Group extending the colour in these beds. of the plants in the rock bed and the centenary bed and you may notice when walking through Church Meadow that there is a new flush of leaves on some of the plants, this may lead to additional flowers though some rain would be helpful for this.

Old Nailstone



This is a picture of Main Street Nailstone in about 1921. The road is not tarmac and the school is in use with railings enclosing the yard. Further on from the school is a large tree which stood in the garden of Malthouse Farm which you can see behind it. Malthouse Close is now there. The church is the same but the tree on the 'point' is much smaller - planted around the turn of the century. On the extreme left hand side you can see the 'Bulls Head' literally an iron representation of a bull's head. The cottages next to the Bull were demolished to make way for the bungalows.
