

Street Lighting Refurbishment - Grant Award Success

for grant funding towards the refurbishment and upgrade of the PC's streetlighting stock and happily the PC has been The work included safety works and the removal of dead notified that the application for grant funding has been

The works are significant as the lighting stock is of various ages and types, including outdated fixings and poles and inefficient sodium bulbs which are being phased out. The works needed include the removal of the old parts and the installation of new poles and LED lamps with dimmers and timers. The use of modern energy efficient parts means a day-to-day running cost savings for the PC and a reduction in the carbon footprint of the lights. The LED lights will be brighter and benefit both residents and motorists. The use of timers and dimmers will comply with modern standards.

The April meeting is a busy one for the PC, as it is the 'AGAR' meeting. AGAR stands for Annual Governance and Accountability return, which is an audit of the PC's finances and financial practices. The PC is audited once a year, both by an internal auditor appointed by the PC and by external auditors. The PC must follow strict rules of financial practice, and these are scrutinised to ensure compliance. At the April meeting the Councillors are presented with the complete year end accounts, detailing payments and receipts, a bank reconciliation, the internal auditor's report as well as an explanation of significant variances alongside the register of fixed assets. The unaudited accounts are published on the PC's website following the April meeting and the results of the external auditor's report are published when received later in the year.

Tree Work

May Meetings

There are two meetings being held in May 2025, the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Council Meeting.

The Annual Parish Meeting is not a PC meeting and has no agenda and Councillors do not attend in their role, but as a resident. In practice the Clerk takes minutes of this meeting. The meeting is intended as a forum for electors and groups within the Parish to provide updates on their activities in the previous year. The Annual Council Meeting is a formal PC meeting, and the first business of this meeting is to elect the Chair and Vice Chair of the PC for the coming year. Once this has been decided, and the acceptance of office has been signed, the meeting progresses as a standard meeting with an agenda.

A reminder that all parishioners are welcome at the PC meetings which take place on the last Wednesday of each month. The May meeting is on the 28th at 7.00 in the church.

Gardening Group

The GG has been busy with two in-person meet ups. We have welcomed the addition of 4 men volunteers - thank you to Brian, Clive, Greg and NAILSTONE Jason - we pride ourselves on being inclusive Group and stress that all are welcome!

Class 31 Colourful Crochet Scarf Set Pattern

Please read 'notes' and 'ehtr' before starting.

You may adjust the width and length of this scarf as you see fit. When extending the width keep in mind that you must chain an even amount of stitches. This ensures that the final stitch count is odd and the pattern works up the way it should

Yarn over and insert your hook into the stitch. Yarn over, pull up a loop. Yarn over and pull through one loop then yarn over and pull through remaining three loops on your hook. The ehtr row is the only row in which the starting chain of 2 is viewed as the first stitch. At the beginning of this row you will chain 2, which counts as the first stitch, then make your first htr in the 2nd stitch. This is simply to keep the edges a little straighter.

- 600g of any Aran weight yarn of any fibre, e.g. wool, acrylic, cotton, etc., in five different colours of choice: A. B. C. D. E.
- 6mm crochet hook
- darning needle

Abbreviations (UK)

htr: half treble dc: double crochet tr: treble ehtr: extended half treble ch: chain rep: repeat

Gauge is not crucial for this pattern, see dimensions for more info on size dimensions roughly: 46cm x 231cm or 18in x 91in (if you wish to extend or decrease size see note)

Pattern Using a 6mm hook ch 60

Using A: Row 1: 1 dc in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc into each ch to end, ch 2, turn [59]

Row 2: ch 2 counts as 1st st, ehtr in 2nd st and each st to end, ch 1, turn

Row 3: 1 htr in 1st st, *ch 1, skip 1 st, 1 htr* rep from * to end making sure st 59 is a htr and in

the 2nd ch of the ch 2 from the previous row, ch 1, turn

Row 4: 1 dc in 1st st, *1 tr in ch 1 space of previous row, 1 dc in top of htr of previous row* rep from * to end

note: each tr will be in a ch 1 space and each dc in a st, last st (59) is a dc

Cut yarn and weave in edges.

Repeat rows 1 to 4 in B, then C, then D, then E.

Repeat colour rows until length is achieved.

Finish with a dc row. Cut yarn & weave in ends.

Class 25: Victoria Sponge Set Recipe

170g butter, softened, or soft margarine (straight from the fridge)

170g caster sugar

3 medium eggs

170g self-raising flour

Raspberry jam to fill (shop bought or homemade)

Method

Set the oven to 160°C (fan oven) or 180°C/gas mark 4

Grease and line the bottom of 2 x 20cm/8-inch sandwich tins.

Cream the butter/margarine and sugar using a wooden spoon or electric beaters very thoroughly until pale in colour. Creaming well will create air in the mixture which will help the cake to rise.

Beat the eggs then gradually add them to the mixture, beating well each time.

Sieve the flour and fold lightly into the mixture with a metal spoon.

Check that the consistency of the mixture is "soft dropping" – ie will just drop off the spoon.

If you have measured accurately no extra liquid should be needed, however, if it is too thick you can add a little milk or

Divide equally between the 2 tins and bake for 25 mins in the middle of the oven.

They are ready when they are golden, shrunk from the sides of the tin and spring back when touched.

Remove from the oven and place on a cooling tray for 5 mins.

Carefully remove the cakes from the tins and sit them on a clean tea towel on top of the cooling tray.

Peel the paper off carefully and fill with raspberry jam when cold to avoid jam bleeding into the cake.

Finish your cake with a light dusting of caster sugar on top.
